Abu Qatada was given asylum in Britain 1993 after fleeing religious persecution in Jordan. Since then he has been convicted in his absence of terrorist offences in Jordan and British intelligence services suspect he has continued to be involved in terrorist activity, though he has not been convicted of terrorism in the UK.

In 2005 a British court ruled that he should be deported to Jordan. Abu Qatada won an appeal against his deportation, claiming that he would not receive a fair trial in Jordan as evidence obtained from torture would be used against him. The government has now signed a treaty with Jordan saying that evidence from torture will not be used against him.
