Currently would-be students apply to universities BEFORE doing their A-levels, and are offered places conditional on them getting the right grades. This gives a longer period of time for would-be students to consider their application and for the universities to process applications and consider candidates, but means they have to rely on predicted exam grades.

Some people have suggested that would-be students should only apply to universities AFTER doing their A-levels. This would leave less time for would-be students to apply for university and for universities to process their applications, but they would be able to base offers on actual exam grades, not predictions
