As you may know, Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac bought up mortgages from banks and mortgage companies, then sold bundles of mortgages on Wall Street to investors. That freed up more money for banks and mortgage companies to offer mortgages to more people, increasing the percentage of Americans who own their own home to over 69% at its peak in 2005. When the housing bubble burst, Fannie and Freddie went into government conservatorship, cost the Federal government over \$150 billion on bad loans and investments, and continue to lose money. Today, with private banks and mortgage companies reluctant to grant new mortgages, the Federal government either owns or guarantees more than 90% of new mortgages and the percentage of Americans who own their own home has declined for five straight years.
